

JENNIFER WEN MA

Born 1973 in Beijing, China Lives and works in New York, USA

The work of Jennifer Wen Ma takes a variety of forms, from video projections and sculptures, to drawings and interactive installations. She has produced a range of site-specific installation and video pieces in Asia and Europe, and in 2008 she was the youngest member of the seven-person planning group for the Opening Ceremony of the Beijing Olympics.

Ma often engages with ceremony and belief through the production of images and events related to ritual. In previous works she has undertaken a series of walks around New York City and Washington DC, clad in a dress with a long ceremonial train (Cleansing Walk, 2003-05); produced a musical installation to be played by the wind under the arches of a monastery bridge in Italy (Aeolian Garden, 2005); and made a video that mixes together the sound of Jewish, Islamic and Catholic prayers (Alms, 2006). These works all combine reflective and contemplative elements with contemporary contexts.

For the festivities around the 2008 Beijing Olympics, Ma produced a spectacular smoke projection of an animated image on to a cloud of smoke. This projection featured Sun Wukong, the Monkey King, a popular and irreverent figure in Chinese mythology. For the 17th Biennale of Sydney, the Monkey King will ride on a cloud high over the Sydney Opera House. Beamed on to a large smoke cloud, the projection of this image will take on a blue cast in the Sydney night sky. In the stories of the classical Chinese novel Journey to the West, differently coloured smokes appear to symbolise the sundry natures of demons and fairies; in this version, a trained performer collaborates with the artist to choreograph the movement of the smoke, enlivening the scene with graceful movements. In Ma's work, she creates cross-cultural hybrids through the various means of technology, symbolic use of colour and intervention into nature.
